#### Punjabi Mela 2006 fails to draw crowd

**■ SAN JOSE, CALIF.:** About 3,500 people attended the San Jose Punjabi Mela 2006, a very late version of the annual Vaisakhi Mela by the same organizers. The event was held at Evergreen Community College grounds on June 11.

Though people came from as far as Sacramento and Central Valley, compared to previous years, this time the gathering was meagre. Although the grounds could hold 15,000 people, vast stretches of the fields between the main stage and vendors at the Mela were deserted. About 25 vendors and half-a-dozen food booths were present to cater to the attendees.

The main stage saw a surfeit of dance performances of all ages ranging from all woman Gidda teams to mixed children's Bhangra and all male adult version all-day long. Fremont siblings Ekvinder Singh (7) and sister Rajwinder Kaur (9), showed up in full Punjabi regalia for the occasion and performed on main stage to a medley of Bhangra music.

Punjabi folk performers Bhupinder Bubble and Ashu Chopra also performed later in the day. An added attraction, in a special fenced off portion of the field, were a couple of Desi Kabbadi matches.

Mohinder Mann, organizer of the event welcomed the attendees and guests as he surveyed the mela in a golf cart. Along with Congesswoman Zoe Lofgren (D-CA), San Jose City Councilmember Cindy Chavez was given a place of prominence at the Mela, in time for her upcoming run-off elections for Mayor of San Jose. Chavez is contesting against fellow Councilman Chuck Reed.

# Two held for Fiji-Indian's murder on camping trip

TWO men have been arrested for the murder of Fijian-Indian, Dipak Prasad (25), whose decomposed body was found in the Sunol Park area last month. The body, hands tied behind, had been lying in the Sunol river creek bed for almost two weeks, after the man was first reported missing.

On June 15, Alameda County Sheriff Lt Bill Gaudinier an-Vance suspected Prasad of

nounced the indictment of Andrew Vance (22) and Kevin West (30) for first-degree murder. Residents of the East SF Bay Area, the two were acquaintances of the deceased. Both Vance and West have been charged sepa-

rately at Alameda Superior Court in Pleasanton and sent to the Santa Rita Jail in Dublin.

Investigations reveal that the three men had gone 'camping' together to Sunol Park on June 1. The accused were seen in the victim's white car, some time after the trip. But Prasad failed to return after the getaway or contact his family, following which his mother filed a missing person report on June 5.

Nearly two weeks later, acting on a tipoff, police found Prasad's body in a creek bed near mile marker 8.2 on Palomares Road in Sunol. Final results of the autopsy will be available after six weeks from the Alameda County Coroner's office. Meanwhile, Prasad's car, a White Lexus (Lic. No.3LRB135), is still reportedly missing.

The tipster, also a witness, informed the

police on the location of the body and the circumstances of the murder. According to court documents and media reports, the witness has cooperated with the police and even recorded conversations with the alleged murderers about the crime.

Initial reports indicate that Vance suspected Prasad of having informed his girlfriend about his being unfaithful. He also suspected him of having 'made moves' on his girlfriend. This led to the weekend plot to lure Prasad to a remote wooded area in the Sunol Recreational Park area where Vance and West allegedly beat up Prasad and choked him to death.
