## Californians flock to welcome Anjolie Ela Menon & her Yatra

RENOWNED artist Anjolie Ela Menon's recent visit to California had a packed schedule: among other things, she was kept busy throughout addressing a number of public events. A measure of her popularity among art lovers and critics alike could be gauged from the crowd that assembled to catch a glimpse of the artist and her artwork, currently on display at the Asian Art Museum, San Francisco and ArtsIndia West, Palo Alto.

On May 20, a reception was held at the prestigious Asian Art Museum. The artist's works have

been installed here for six months, the centerpiece of which is the large triptych entitled Yatra. The event was attended by over 200 people, including India's Consul General in San Francisco, B. S. Prakash.

Forrest McGill, the Chief Curator and Wattis Curator of South and Southeast Asian Art at the Asian Art Museum welcomed the audience and thanked Gallery ArtsIndia and ArtsIndia West for making the installation possible. He also introduced a representative from the sponsor, Merrell Lynch, who spoke of their interest in supporting the arts. Bindu Gude, Assistant Curator of South Asian Art, expressed the Museum's excitement at hosting this installation of contemporary art and introduced Menon, who gave an insightful, visuallyaided speech about her art and inspirations.

Prajit Dutta, a partner in Gallery ArtsIndia, later gave a rousing speech encouraging attendees of the upcoming possibilities for In-



dian art overseas. Dutta urged patrons to see this installation as a first step to ensure that the status of Indian art would be a recognized member of the international contemporary and modern art scenes. Art enthusiasts had other opportunities to meet and hear Menon while she was in the Bay Area when ArtsIndia West, with Montalvo Arts Center and SACHI, organized a meet on May 18. Art lovers took the opportunity to ask questions of the artist as well as get Menon to personalize a copy of the new retrospective published by ArtsIndia with text by Gayatri Sinha entitled Anjolie Ela Menon.

Earlier in the day, ArtsIndia West hosted a ladies luncheon where patrons of the gallery met Menon, and offered a preview of her up-coming exhibition in Palo Alto. "This exhibition has already become a success in the short time since it started. It will run through June 13," said Nuala Mellett of ArtsIndia West.

■ ARTESIA, CALIF.: Over 200 blood tests for diabetes and cholesterol, 99 eye examinations, 94 EKGs, 45 mammograms and papsmears, 65 bone density assessments and nearly 350 general examinations were conducted at the free health fair organized by the Hindu Cultural Center here on June 4.

The camp was conducted by Dr Nitin Shah, an anaesthesiologist, and his team of about 40 medical professionals and 70 volunteers.
