Britney turns to Hinduism for solace

POP star Britney Spears seems to be seeking solace in Hinduism if her latest activities are any indicator of her religious preferences.

The pop diva was spotted at the famous Hindu temple at Malibu in California, recently with her fourmonth-old son Sean Preston, though husband Kevin Federline was conspicuous by his absence. She offered prayers at the Lord Venkateswara Temple and the Ganesha Temple. The star, whose marriage with Federline has reportedly struck turbulence, was seen wearing a vermillion spot on her forehead after she sat through elaborate rituals conducted by the temple priests Narasimha Bhattar and Krishnamachary.

She promised to return to the Malibu temple and made a commitment to conduct more elaborate pujas in future. The artist, who was raised a Baptist and was initiated into the mystical Jewish religion of Kabbalah by Madonna, is reportedly also visiting Hindu mystics for a peek into the past and the future.

The temple's president Nadadur Varadhan explained to her the various tenets of Hinduism as well as the significance of the rituals being carried out. "She showed a lot of interest in the religion and was quite fascinated by the prasadam offered by the temple in the form of puliogere and sadam (rice)," Varadhan told The Indian Express.

Varadhan elaborated that several celebrities have earlier come to this temple to seek blessing of Lord Venkateswara. "We have welcomed the Beach Boys, the Beetles and even Robert Downey Jr. There seems to be a belief in Hollywood that Hinduism is the panacea for many of their troubles and in particular this temple. Hollywood considers this temple as a destination wherein their prayers are answered; in fact, Beatle George Harrison was an ardent devotee of our temple and our priests conducted several poojas and

ceremonies at his home. When he passed away, his body was cremated in accordance with Hindu rituals by our priest. Besides being a vegetarian, Harrison had great devotion to the Hindu faith.
